Record serial numbers of valuables
Take pictures of valuables
Leave precious valuables not needed on campus such as jewelry-at home
Lock doors to residence
Keep residence windows locked
Lock bicycles

Lock doors to vehicle
Keep vehicle windows rolled up
Do not leave valuables inside vehicle
Park on campus lots instead of side streets

DON'T FORGET TO PROTECT YOURSELF

Walk with a buddy (especially at night)
Avoid poorly lit and densely populated areas
Do not let strangers into your residence
Do not give rides to strangers
Do not give money to panhandlers
Report suspicious activity
Park on campus lots instead of side streets

Though our winter has been mild thus far, cold weather is bound to rear its ugly head. When it does, protect yourself against car theft. Many individuals leave their vehicle unattended while warming the engine. With keys in the ignition and the doors unlocked, criminals attack, leaving the driver abandoned.

75% of vehicle thefts in our area had keys in the ignition. It may be a minor inconvenience to sit in a cold car as it warms, but it is better than having no car at all...
